Sadducees

- This is the Jewish aristocratic class that were in charge of the temple, priesthood, and Sanhedrin as well as relationships with the Roman government.
- Although not mentioned by name in this passage, they would have been the priests responsible for the temple defilement that Jesus confronts.
- They were notoriously corrupt, materialistic, and rejected any notion of resurrection or afterlife.

Jesus' authority is questioned as he was not recognized as a priest. Jesus' reference to his resurrection had to be seen as him taunting the Sadducees.


Four cultural observations

- Every year the Jews would bring to the Temple in Jerusalem an offering.
 - a. Those from out of town would buy the offering in Jerusalem when they got there.
 - b. They often came with foreign currency that would defile the temple unless exchanged.
- The Sadducees moved this business inside the temple walls so that they could have a monopoly on the economic affairs of the Passover week.
- This made the Court of the Gentiles virtually impossible to be used for worship by Gentiles.
- This was especially hard on the poor who would be paying as much as 20 times what they should.

John 2


"12 After this He went down to Capernaum, He and His mother, and His brothers, and His disciples; and there they stayed a few days.13 And the Passover of the Jews was at hand, and Jesus went up to Jerusalem. 14 And He found in the temple those who were selling oxen and sheep and doves, and the moneychangers seated. 15 And He made a scourge of cords, and drove them all out of the temple, with the sheep and the oxen; and He poured out the coins of the moneychangers, and overturned their tables; 16 and to those who were selling the doves He said, "Take these things away; stop making My Father's house a house of merchandise." 17 His disciples remembered that it was written, "Zeal for Thy house will consume me.""

"18 The Jews therefore answered and said to Him, "What sign do You show to us, seeing that You do these things?" 19 Jesus answered and said to them, "Destroy this temple, and in three days I will raise it up." 20 The Jews therefore said, "It took forty-six years to build this temple, and will You raise it up in three days?" 21 But He was speaking of the temple of His body. 22 When therefore He was raised from the dead. His disciples remembered that He said this; and they believed the Scripture, and the word which Jesus had spoken. 23 Now when He was in Jerusalem at the Passover, during the feast, many believed in His name, beholding His signs which He was doing. 24 But Jesus, on His part, was not entrusting Himself to them, for He knew all men, 25 and because He did not need anyone to bear witness concerning man for He Himself knew what was in man."



Romans 1

"1 Paul, a bond-servant of Christ Jesus, called as an apostle, set apart for the gospel of God, 2 which He promised beforehand through His prophets in the holy Scriptures, 3 concerning His Son, who was born of a descendant of David according to the flesh, 4 who was declared the Son of God with power by the resurrection from the dead, according to the Spirit of holiness, Jesus Christ our Lord,"



Dividing the Church

1 Corinthians 3

"10 According to the grace of God which was given to me, as a wise master builder I laid a foundation, and another is building upon it. But let each man **be careful how he builds** upon it. . . . 16 **Do you not know that you are a temple of God**, and that the Spirit of God dwells in you? 17 If any man destroys the temple of God, God will destroy him, for **the temple of God is holy, and that is what you are**."

Application to the Church Body of Christ

• If we behave so as to damage the Body of Christ, we will be disciplined as were the money changers.

How do we avoid damaging the church?

- It starts with acknowledge the holiness of the church.
- It involves majoring on majors and minoring on minors - a leader, a doctrine, a denomination, a personal taste, style, or gift.
- Some indications of trouble jealousy & strife, pride & segregation, immaturity & carnality.

"Did you get anything out of that sermon or service?"

A healthy disciple is easily edified

- If the Word of God is opened and the name of Jesus is lifted up and you get nothing, it says more about you than the setting, sermon, leaders, and company.
- Make a commitment to not leave a meeting of worship without bringing something and taking something away.
- Pray for a word from the Spirit to YOU and then LISTEN to what the Spirit says THROUGH the sermon. Pray for a reminder of who God is and what He has done and then look for an opportunity to praise and thank Him.

Disrespecting the Poor

1 Corinthians 11

"20 Therefore when you meet together, **it is not to eat the Lord's Supper**, 21 for in your eating each one takes his own supper first; and one is hungry and another is drunk. 22 What! Do you not have houses in which to eat and drink? Or **do you despise the church of God**, **and shame those who have nothing?** What shall I say to you? Shall I praise you? In this I will not praise you."

Application to the Church Respecting the Poor

• The easiest way to damage the Body of Christ is to marginalize the powerless that Jesus protected.

How do we avoid marginalize the powerless?

- It starts with our looking at people through the eyes of Jesus.
- It involves resisting the values of this age favoring wealth, power, personality, position, fearing those who are different.
- **Some indications of trouble -** little diversity of social friendships, no desire to understand those unlike us.

Defiling the human body

1 Corinthians 6


"12 All things are lawful for me, but not all things are profitable. All things are lawful for me, but **I will not be mastered by anything**. 13 Food is for the stomach, and the stomach is for food; but God will do away with both of them. Yet the body is not for immorality, but for the Lord; and the Lord is for the body. . . . 18 **Flee immorality**. Every other sin that a man commits is outside the body, but the immoral man sins against his own body. 19 Or do you not know that **your body is a temple of the Holy Spirit** who is in you, whom you have from God, and that you are not your own? 20 For you have been bought with a price: therefore glorify God in your body."

Application to the human body

• If we behave so as to morally defile our bodies, we will be disciplined as were the money changers.

How do we keep from defile our body?

- · It starts with our respecting its holiness.
- It involves giving up the right over our own bodies refusing to see its appetites are a stewardship.
- **Some indications of trouble -** addictive behaviors, fornication, gluttony, disrespect for others.



The point of the temple cleansing

God's temple serves a spiritual purpose which must not be hijacked for a personal agenda.

The relevance for us

Our bodies & the Body of Christ belong to God & are our stewardship.
