

1 Peter 3

"1 In the same way, you wives, be submissive to your own husbands so that even if any of them are disobedient to the word, they may be won without a word by the behavior of their wives, 2 as they observe your chaste and respectful behavior.

"22 Wives, be subject to your own husbands, as to the Lord. 23 For the husband is the **head** of the wife, as Christ also is the head of the church, He Himself being the Savior of the body. 24 But as the church is subject to Christ, so also the wives ought to be to

In what kind of civilized world can this "sexist teaching" ever make sense and not be degrading, abusive, and unfair?

It challenges the very core of Western culture's values.

- · Social justice Roles in a just society should be achieved, not ascribed by gender, race, religion, etc.
- · Pragmatic efficiency Ability (gifts) should determine roles and position, not gender.
- · Psychological health Self worth is linked to freedom to compete for social position, respect, and power.
- · Human rights Individuals are to be responsible and free to determine their own roles and positions in life.

Gender based roles in marriage

- This has been the historic understanding of Apostolic teaching.
- This is the general pattern throughout Scripture.
- This has been the church's practice for nearly all of its history.
- This has been one of the great stumbling blocks for the Gospel in the modern era.





Context

How are Christians to see their relationship to God?

1 Peter 2

"9 But you are **a chosen race, a royal priesthood, a** holy nation, a people for God's own possession,

so that

you may proclaim the excellencies of Him who has called you out of darkness into His marvelous light;"

Christians are to be privileged proclaimers.

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Context

How are Christians to see their relationship to the world?

1 Peter 2

"11 Beloved, I urge you as aliens and strangers to abstain from fleshly lusts which wage war against the soul. 12 Keep your behavior excellent among the Gentiles,

SO that

in the things in which they slander you as evildoers, they may because of your good deeds, as they observe them glorify $\operatorname{God} \dots$ "

Christians are to lay aside their privilege for the "Way of the Cross".

Context

How are Christians to see their relationship to Christ?

1 Peter 2

"21 For you have been called for this purpose, since **Christ also suffered for you, leaving you an example for you to follow in His steps**, 22 who committed no sin, nor was any deceit found in His mouth; 23 and while being reviled, He did not revile in return; while suffering, He uttered no threats, but **kept entrusting Himself to Him** who judges righteously; 24 and He Himself bore our sins in His body on the cross,

so that

we might die to sin and live to righteousness; for by His wounds you were healed. 25 For you were continually straying like sheep, but now you have returned to the Shepherd and **Guardian of your souls**."

Christians are to follow Christ's example.

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Mark 8:34

"If anyone wishes to come after me, he must deny himself, and take up his cross and follow me."



1 Corinthians 1:18

"For the **word of the cross** is to those who are perishing **foolishness**, but to us who are being saved it is the **power of God**."

$Philippians\ 2$

"5 Have this attitude in yourselves which was also in Christ Jesus, 6 who, although He existed in the form of God, did not regard equality with God a thing to be grasped, 7 but emptied Himself, taking the form of a bond-servant, and being made in the likeness of men. 8 And being found in appearance as a man, He humbled Himself by becoming obedient to the point of death, even death on a cross."



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The Way of the Cross will distinguish Jesus' followers as aliens and sojourners in America.

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1 Peter 3

"1 In the same way, you **wives**, be submissive to your own husbands

so that

even if any of them are **disobedient** to the word, they may be won without a word by the behavior of their wives, 2 as they observe your **chaste** and **respectful** behavior.

Christian wives are to mentor husbands in the way of the Cross through their chastity and respect.

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"3 And let not your adornment be merely external -braiding the hair, and wearing gold jewelry, or putting on dresses; 4 but let it be the hidden person of the heart, with the imperishable quality of a gentle and quiet spirit, which is precious in the sight of God. 5 For in this way in former times the holy women also, who **hoped in God**, used to adorn themselves, being submissive to their own husbands. 6 Thus Sarah obeyed Abraham, calling him lord, and you have become her children if you do what is right without being frightened by any fear."

- Submission is to be from the heart and not superficial.
- Submission is not a response to fear but rather an expression of our faith in the face of fear.

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1 Peter 3

"7 You **husbands likewise**, live with your wives in an understanding way, as with a weaker (**vulnerable** 2 Cor.10:10) vessel, since she is a woman; and grant her honor as a fellow heir of the grace of life,

so that

your prayers may not be hindered."

2 Corinthians 10:10

"For they say, "His letters are weighty and strong, but his personal presence is **weak**, and his speech contemptible.""

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1 Peter 3

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Christian husbands are to connect with their wives in ways that show understanding and grant honor.

The sacrifice the husbands are asked to make for their wives is greater than the sacrifice that wives are asked to make in submitting to their husbands.

- The wife's submission involves trusting God and overcoming fear as she yields to her mate, while her husband is asked to answer to God as he bears responsibility for his priestly role in the family.
- The husband is asked to model his life after Christ in a way the wife is not.
- The husband needs the support of his wife if he is to fulfill his calling and vice versa.

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Before we apply this teaching we must embrace four truths.

- 1. The sense of security and significance that every believer has "in Christ".
- 2. Social roles tend to reflect cultural values.

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
- 3. The "Way of the Cross" will be counter cultural.

The "family" is a theme in Scripture

- · God is called "Father", we are His "children".
- The Old Testament is the story of a family whose father was Abraham.
- Members of the church are called "brothers & sisters".
- · The core of family are husband and wife.
 - √ Heaven is pictured as a "marriage feast".
 - √ The church is called the "bride of Christ".
- √ The relationship of husband and wife is a picture of "Christ and the church".


Marriage showcases the "Way of the Cross."


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



Family "facts"

- Experiments to replace the family have not proven successful.
- Families throughout history have been patriarchal.
- Dysfunctional families are a chief source of social dysfunction in a society.
- Families are fragile and need the support of a broader community.
- Christians have made both good and bad contributions to family health.









Three common misperceptions.

- Defining power positionally, freedom politically, and happiness materially.
- · Confusing authority (in one sphere) with superiority (in all spheres).
- Failing to see marriage as two individuals becoming one flesh.

Refusing to embrace both our spiritual dignity & alien status.

The most common abuses.


Insecure men who equate headship with superiority and leadership with privilege.

Rather than sanctifying, completing, and listening to women, they abuse and dishonor them.

Wounded women who equate role with worth and position with freedom/power.

Rather than helping men fulfill their difficult calling with respectful support, they seek their own fulfillment through independence 27

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

Possible analogy

The husband is like the point guard on a basketball team.



- He is first and foremost a member of a team.
- He need not be the most valuable player or even the most gifted leader on the team.
- He is assigned the role of initiating play.
- He may not be the only one who initiates play.
- The team is "his team" because he represents it and is responsible for its proper functioning.

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Possible analogy

The wife is like any other player on a basketball team.



- · She is first and foremost a member of a team.
- · Her primary role is not to initiate play or lead the team but to execute play using her strengths.
- She may be the most valuable player and the "behind the scenes" leader.
- She gets great satisfaction and honor from her work in enabling the team to function successfully.

"Gender roles are not so much dictated by rules as by relationships built on a shared understanding of the Body of Christ and commitment to the "Way of the Cross."

The greatest challenge that most of us face with respect to this issue.

Taking our baptism seriously

- Taking our position in Christ seriously
- · Taking our alien status seriously
