

Ephesians 6

"5 **Slaves**, be obedient to those who are your masters according to the flesh, with fear and trembling, in the sincerity of your heart, as to Christ; 6 . . . doing the will of God from the heart. 7 With good will render service, as to the Lord, and not to men, . . . 9 And, **masters**, do the same things to them, and give up threatening, knowing that both their Master and yours is in heaven, and there is no partiality with Him."

Paul's teaching

courageous or outrageous

How are we to process this?



This teaching is shocking to:

Ancient Roman culture

by what it says to Masters

It challenged a master's "right" to exercise his "position of power" over his slaves.

Modern Western culture

by what it says to Slaves

It challenged a slave's "right" to demand freedom from his enslavement.

Both are reminded that they are slaves to Christ no matter where they serve.

1. The Word of the Cross

Corinthians 1

"18 For the word of the cross is to those who are perishing foolishness, but to us who are being saved it is the power of God. . . . 22 For indeed Jews ask for signs, and Greeks search for wisdom; 23 but we preach Christ crucified, to Jews a stumbling block, and to Gentiles foolishness, 24 but to those who are the called, both Jews and Greeks, Christ the power of God and the wisdom of God. 25 Because the foolishness of God is wiser than men, and the weakness of God is stronger than men."

2. The kingdom of God

John 18:36

"Jesus answered, "My kingdom is not of this world. If My kingdom were of this world, then My servants would be fighting, that I might not be delivered up to the Jews; but as it is, My kingdom is not of this realm.""


The chosen of God

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3. Bondage to Christ.

John 21:18

"Truly, truly, I say to you, when you were younger, you used to gird yourself, and walk wherever you wished; but when you grow old, you will stretch out your hands, and someone else will gird you, and **bring you where you do not wish to go**."

- Slaves to Christ will be asked to share his suffering and go where they would not choose to go.
- We find our new life by losing our old.


Expectations for this life

1 Corinthians 4

"10 We are **fools** for Christ's sake, but you are prudent in Christ; we are **weak**, . . . we are **without honor**. 11 . . . we are both **hungry** and **thirsty**, and are **poorly clothed**, and are **roughly treated**, and are **homeless**; 12 . . . when we are **reviled**, we bless; when we are **persecuted**, we endure; 13 when we are **slandered**, we try to conciliate;"

"If we have hoped in Christ **in this life only**, we are of all men most to be pitied."



4. Freedom in Spirit.

In what sense does Christ free us?

Luke 4:18

"The Spirit of the Lord is upon Me, Because He anointed Me to preach the gospel to the poor. He has sent Me to proclaim **release to the captives**, And recovery of sight to the blind, To set **free those who are downtrodden**."

John 14:27

"Peace I leave with you; my peace I give to you; **not as the world gives**, do I give to you. Let not your heart be troubled, nor let it be fearful."




"16 I will ask the Father, and He will give you another **Helper**, that he may be with you forever; . . . 18 I will not leave you as orphans; I will come to you. 19 After a little while the world will behold Me no more; but you will behold Me; because I live, you shall live also. . . . 27 **Peace** I leave with you; My peace I give to you; not as the world gives do I give to you, Do not let your heart be troubled, nor let it be fearful."






Some are going to feel that these points are easier on the master than the slave.

But consider what the master is asked to give up:

- The privilege and power that come with his position.
- The freedom to use his position for his purposes.
- The freedom from responsibility for those under his care.
