


It is common with both liberals and conservatives.





The Way of the Cross for the poor

Isaiah 53:7

"He was oppressed and afflicted, Yet He did not open His mouth; like a lamb that is led to slaughter, and like a sheep that is silent before its shearers, so He did not open His mouth."

James 5:6

"You have condemned and put to death the righteous man; he does not resist you."

Like Jesus, "the righteous" (poor)

does not "resist".

The Way of the Cross for the rich

Philippians 2

6 (Jesus) who, although He existed in the form of God, did not regard equality with God a thing to be grasped, 7 but emptied **Himself**, taking the form of a bond-servant,"

James 1:10

"and the rich man is to glory in his humiliation, because like flowering grass he will pass away."

Like Jesus, "the righteous" (rich)

does not "retain".

- Life demands patience of EVERYONE.
- PROCESS will call for patience.
 - CAUSE & EFFECT tutors us to appreciate creation and providence.
 - MORAL VIRTUES (like courage, temperance, wisdom, etc.) are linked to patience.
 - COMMUNITY is developed as we learn to cooperate, which involves respect and waiting.

- Patience under delayed gratification can strengthen THE HEART.
 - It will build hope for CHRIST'S RETURN.
 - It will nurture FAITH IN GOD (not this world).
- Patience under delayed gratification can still SOCIAL CONFLICT.
 - We tire of hearing about what we should fear and who we should blame.

Waiting forces us to ask - What is the essence of LIFE?

- The promised "blessings" are exemplified in the lives of Jesus and his disciples
 - They are not CIRCUMSTANTIAL or MATERIAL.
 - They are not without SUFFERING.
 - They are **EXPERIENTIAL**.
 - They are SPIRITUAL (peace, love, joy).

James 5

"10 As an example, brethren, of **suffering** and **patience**, take the prophets who spoke in the name of the Lord."

- The O.T. prophets proclaimed the PROMISES OF GOD.
 - They did not always EXPERIENCE THEM IN THIS LIFE.
 - Their faith WAS NOT SHAKEN.
- Waiting will involve SUFFERING and ENDURANCE.
 - JESUS is our example.
 - This is the WAY OF THE CROSS.

Romans 8

"22 For we know that the whole creation groans and suffers the pains of childbirth together until now. 23 And not only this, but also we ourselves, having the first fruits of the Spirit, even we ourselves groan within ourselves, waiting eagerly for our adoption as sons, the redemption of our body. 24 For in hope we have been saved, but hope that is seen is not hope; for why does one also hope for what he sees? 25 But if we hope for what we do not see, with perseverance we wait eagerly for it."

"11 We count those blessed who **endured**. You have heard of the **endurance** of Job and have seen the outcome of the Lord's dealings, that the Lord is full of compassion and *is* merciful."

- Blessing comes through ENDURANCE.
- JOB'S expectations were crushed.
 - He never knew WHY.
 - He had no SOCIAL SUPPORT.
 - In this life, he was REWARDED.

NOTE: Ultimately, Job died and lost the things of this world "for good" - for something REAL GOOD.

For Christians Everything is O.K. in the end.

If it's not O.K. it's not the end.

Observations

- James starts and ends his letter with addressing Hard Times in this world.
 Expect to bear a cross in following Christ.
- His hope comes not in this age but at Christ's return. Don't expect heaven on this earth.
- He anticipates that disciples might turn on one another if they are not patient. Patience must be expressed to one another as to God.



 He points to O.T. saints who waited patiently even though the promises did not come in their lifetime. Know that you are not alone in waiting.

This passage has implications for:

- Our everyday life, especially if we follow Christ. Expect to bear a cross.
- Social justice, especially systemic change. Expect to wait, endure, and encourage.
- Our hope, especially with respect to fullness of life. Expect to miss out on much in this age but not in the next.

Hebrews 11

"36 and others experienced mockings and scourgings, yes, also chains and imprisonment.
37 They were stoned, they were sawn in two, they were tempted, they were put to death with the sword; they went about in sheepskins, in goatskins, being destitute, afflicted, ill-treated 38 (men of whom the world was not worthy), wandering in deserts and mountains and caves and holes in the ground. 39 And all these, having gained approval through their faith, did not receive what was promised, 40 because God had provided something better for us, so that apart from us they should not be made perfect."

Hebrews 12

"1 Therefore, since we have so great a cloud of witnesses surrounding us, let us also lay aside every encumbrance, and the sin which so easily entangles us, and let us run with endurance the race that is set before us, 2 fixing our eyes on Jesus, the author and perfecter of faith, who for the joy set before Him endured the cross, despising the shame, and has sat down at the right hand of the throne of God."

Once we understand the Cross two things become clearer.

- What stands between us and peace with God is not our sin so much as faith in Jesus.
- 2. What stands between us and reform is not political impotence so much as Jesus' "Way of the Cross".
