1 Corinthians 12

"28 And God has appointed in the church, first apostles, second prophets, third teachers, then miracles, then **gifts of healings**, helps, administrations, various kinds of tongues."






The problem of Biblical teaching

✓ Illness is linked to Death, the fulfillment of God's promise to all who are in Adam.

√ God's promise of deliverance, is not healing now but in a coming resurrection.

The peace and power of God are offered in the midst of suffering more than through removal from it.

- Physical healing is not a salve or solution but a sign of authority and the Gospel message.
 - Those who ignore this teaching are exchanging the Word & Way of the Cross for the world's temporal values.

Three things we should know about healing prayer.

1. Its relationship to Christ's atonement.

Matthew 8:17

"in order that what was spoken through Isaiah the prophet might be fulfilled, saying, 'He Himself took our infirmities, and carried away our diseases."

The atonement removed our illnesses in the same way it removed our sins

- Past The spiritual curse of sin is gone.
- Present The power of sin is broken.
- Future The resurrection removes sin.

Healing prayer (like Christ's resurrection) is a "sign" indicating Christ's authority over sin and death.

Matthew 9:6

"5 For which is easier, to say, Your sins are forgiven,' or to say, 'Rise, and walk'? 6 But in order that you may know that the Son of Man has authority on earth to forgive sins'—then He said to the paralytic—'Rise, take up your bed, and go home.' 7 And he rose, and went home."

Healing prayer is only temporary and insufficient (not an end in itself).

John 20

"30 Many other **signs** therefore Jesus also performed in the presence of the disciples, which are not written in this book; 31 but these have been written that you may believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God; and that believing you may have life in His name."

Healing prayer is a part of Jesus credentials as the Messiah.

Three things we should know about healing prayer.

2. Its relationship to our heart and God's.

Psalm 37:4

"Delight yourself in the Lord, and He will give you the desires of your heart."

"the desires of your heart" = a peace this world cannot give or take away.

"Delight yourself in the Lord" = be in sync with His Spirit, values, priorities, etc.

"He will give you" = God can satisfy our deepest desires and the world cannot.

God's Spirit knows the desire of our heart and syncs our anxiety with His agenda.

Romans 8

"26 And in the same way the Spirit also helps our weakness; for we do not know how to pray as we should, but the Spirit Himself intercedes for us with groanings too deep for words; 27 and He who searches the hearts knows what the mind of the Spirit is, because **He intercedes for the saints according to the will of God.** 28 And we know that God causes all things to work together for good to those who love God, to those who are called **according to His purpose**."

The key to healing prayer is not our "faith" so much as being in sync with God's will.

1 John 5

"14 And this is the confidence which we have before Him, that, if we ask anything **according to His will**, He hears us. 15 And if we know that He hears us in **whatever we ask**, we know that we have the requests which we have asked from Him."

1 John 5 (paraphrase)

"14 We can have confidence that God grants our requests when they are in sync with His Kingdom's purpose, priorities, principles, plan, etc."

God's will is found on the far side of our renewed mind.

Romans 12

"1 I urge you therefore, brethren, by the mercies of God, to present your bodies a living and holy sacrifice, acceptable to God, which is your spiritual service of worship. 2 And do not be conformed to this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your mind, that you may prove what the will of God is, that which is good and acceptable and perfect."

John 3

"29 . . . So this joy of mine has been made full.
30 He must increase, but **I must decrease**."

As "living sacrifices" we don't call the shots, just raise the subject.

1 Peter 5

"6 Therefore humble yourselves under the mighty hand of God, so that He may exalt you at the proper time, 7 having **cast all your anxiety on Him**, because He cares about you."



God asks for our cares

not our counsel or commands as to how He should respond.

Three things we should know about healing prayer.

3. Its relationship to the Way of the Cross.

1 Corinthians 15

"42 (this physical body) is sown a perishable body, it is raised an imperishable body; 43 it is sown in **dishonor**, it is raised in glory; it is sown in **weakness**, it is raised in power; 44 it is sown a **natural** body, it is raised a spiritual body. . . . 47 The first man is from the earth, **earthy**; the second man is from heaven. . . . 50 Now I say this, brethren, that **flesh and blood cannot inherit the kingdom of God**; nor does the perishable inherit the imperishable."

John 15:16

"You did not choose me, but I chose you, and appointed you, that you should **go and bear fruit**, (not live the American dream), and that your fruit should remain, that **whatever you ask** of the Father in my name, He may give to you."

As ambassadors for Christ we have his authority to ask anything that is in sync with God's values and priorities (not ours).

James 4:3

"You ask and do not receive, because you ask with so that you may **spend** *it* **on your pleasures**."


"3 You ask and do not receive, because you ask with **wrong motives**, so that you may spend *it* on **your pleasures.** 4 You adulteresses, do you not know that **friendship with the world** is hostility toward God?"

- Why would God not always grant our requests to remove our trials?
- Could it be that He knows we will see our healing as a gift for our pleasure more than a sign for His purpose.
- Could it be that He knows we might, like ancient Israel and Corinth, be tempted to worship the gift and not the Giver.

A theology of death and suffering

Way of this World

Way of the Kingdom

Hope is in this world

Hope is beyond this world

Baptism

moves our reference from this world to God's kingdom.

The Way of the Cross

is the normal way God calls us to reflect the life of Christ in this world.

Signs and Wonders

can be a temporary change in circumstances but more so a change in perspective and attitude.

1 Corinthians 1

"26 For consider your calling, brethren, that there were not many wise according to the flesh, not many mighty, not many noble; 27 but God has chosen the foolish things of the world to shame the wise, and God has chosen the weak (Jas.5:14 "sick") things of the world to shame the things which are strong,"

God chooses to bless those who are not blessed by the world's standards -

 not by changing their outward condition but by giving them power in and through their weaknesses to mock the world.

Paul's testimony is an example.

2 Corinthians 12

"7 And because of the surpassing greatness of the revelations, for this reason, to keep me from exalting myself, there was given me a thorn in the flesh, a messenger of Satan to buffet me - to keep me from exalting myself! 8 Concerning this I entreated the Lord three times that it might depart from me. 9 And He has said to me, "My grace is sufficient for you, for power is perfected in weakness." . . . 10 Therefore I am well content with weaknesses, with insults, with distresses, with persecutions, with difficulties, for Christ's sake; for when I am weak, then I am strong."

Paul's thorn was both from Satan and an instrument for God.

Bodily illness was referenced by Paul without surprise or apology.

1 Timothy 5:23

"No longer drink water exclusively, but use a little wine for the sake of your stomach and **your** frequent ailments."

2 Timothy 4:20

"but Trophimus I left sick at Miletus."

Galatians 4

"13 but you know that it was because of a **bodily illness** that I preached the gospel to you the first time; 14 and that which was a trial to you in my bodily condition you did not despise or loathe,"

James 1;2

"2 Consider it all joy, my brethren, when you encounter various trials;"

1 Peter 3:21

"For you have been **called for this purpose**, since Christ also suffered for you, leaving you an example for you to follow in His steps,"

1 Peter 4

"1 Therefore, since Christ has suffered in the flesh, arm yourselves also with the same purpose, 12 Beloved, do not be surprised at the fiery ordeal among you, which comes upon you for your testing, as though some strange thing were happening to you; 13 but to the degree that you share the sufferings of Christ, keep on rejoicing,"

Lessons for us

- Healing prayer is not about our comfort. It is about a witness to the resurrection hope.
- Take our baptism seriously We are aliens in this world and ambassadors for Christ.
- Know ourself, accept ourself, get over ourself, and give ourself - Jesus came for the purpose of freeing us from this body of death unto a hope through resurrection with Christ.
- · Should we pray for healing Yes!

But from what?

 Bring our anxieties to God, not our agenda for His response.
