

Observations of Anthropology

- Religion (broadly defined) seems to be a unique and universal characteristic of humans.
- Primitive polytheistic and modern materialistic expressions of religion tend to be tied to some form of nature worship. Rom. 1:24-25 worship of human passions and nature.
- Biblical expressions of religion are unique.

Genesis 3:3



Docetism (to seem)

meaning that Christ's body was not human but only seemed so, either as a phantom or of real but celestial substance.

His suffering was only apparent.

This was a doctrine in the early church associated with heretical Gnosticism.

Some people think that John's writings are addressing this issue.


John 19

"31 The Jews therefore, because it was the day of preparation, so that the bodies should not remain on the cross on the Sabbath (for that Sabbath was a high day), asked Pilate that their legs might be broken, and that they might be taken away. 32 The soldiers therefore came, and broke the legs of the first man, and of the other man who was crucified with Him; 33 but coming to Jesus, when they saw that He was already dead, they did not break His legs; 34 but one of the soldiers pierced His side with a spear, and immediately there came out blood and water 35 And he who has seen has borne witness, and his witness is true; and he knows that he is telling the truth, so that you also may believe. 36 For these things came to pass, that the Scripture might be fulfilled, "Not a bone of Him shall be broken."

"37 And again another Scripture says, "They shall look on Him whom they pierced." 38 And after these things Joseph of Arimathea, being a disciple of Jesus, but a secret one, for fear of the Jews, asked Pilate that he might take away the body of Jesus; and Pilate granted permission. He came therefore, and took away His body. 39 And Nicodemus came also, who had first come to Him by night; bringing a mixture of myrrh and aloes, about a hundred pounds weight. 40 And so they took the body of Jesus, and bound it in linen wrappings with the spices, as is the burial custom of the Jews. 41 Now in the place where He was crucified there was a garden; and in the garden a new tomb, in which no one had yet been laid. 42 Therefore on account of the Jewish day of preparation, because the tomb was nearby, they laid Jesus there."

Why is the humanity of Jesus important?

- He needed to fulfill his Messianic role as priest and substitutionary sacrifice.
- He needed to be able to empathize with and intercede for us. Heb.4:15
- He needed to affirm the dignity of all humanity.
- He needed to model for us what it means to be fully human.

What it means to be fully human? Expectations

- Abundant life (security, significance, serenity) will be found in harmony with the values of God's kingdom.
- Life in a broken world calls for love in the face of suffering.
- · Our ultimate hope is not in this world or this life.

Priorities

- We are to cultivate a vibrant personal relationship with God through Christ.
- We are to respect the dignity of all people, especially those who are pushed out, stepped on, or left behind.
- With respect to our cultural environment we are to be thermostats rather than thermometers.
