




Mark 10

"28 Peter began to say to Him, "Behold, we have left everything and followed You." 29 Jesus said, "Truly I say to you, there is no one who has left house or brothers or sisters or mother or father or children or farms, for My sake and for the gospel's sake, 30 but that he shall receive a hundred times as much now in the present age, houses and brothers and sisters and mothers and children and farms, along with persecutions; and in the age to come, eternal life. 31 But many who are first, will be last; and the last, first."







In "Priming the Pump Theology" Worldliness = a lack of faith

- 1. A lack of faith in the desire of God to bless you materially.
- 2. A lack of faith in the promises of God to keep His word.
- 3. A lack of faith in God's honoring the sowing of your seed.
- 4. A lack of faith in persevering in hope that the blessings will eventually come.

Priming the Pump Theology has two versions **Covert version** Overt version emphasizes emphasizes FAITH FAITHFULNESS God promises God will bless me to give me in this life if, when, the desire of my heart and because through sowing a seed I am faithful. and faith.

1 Corinthians 13:13

"But now faith, hope, love, abide these three; but the greatest of these is love."




3. Persevering faith in God to grant us the object of our love and hope.

True Worldliness

involves an un-renewed mind that misunderstands grace and confuses the Kingdom with this world.

- 1. No bartering in the Kingdom of God.
- 2. Faith and faithfulness are a response to God's grace, not a ransom for it.
- 3. The basic desire of our heart is shalom, not the worldly means to pseudo peace.

The essence of shalom is **rest** in the face of brokenness.

- 1. Reconciliation with God & others .
- 2. Restoration of inner and outer life.

But what about the promised 100 times return?

- 1. What were they seeking and expecting?
- 2. What did they experience?
- 3. What did they teach about true wealth and wisdom?
- 4. What was Jesus' example?

John 14:27


Mark 1

Example of Jesus being IN but not OF the world.

Disciples are free from a preoccupation with gaining and hoarding the stuff of this world as a source of their identity and security.

What is this passage about?

- 1. This promise is not about money.
- 2. Social service and asceticism are not the primary objectives of the Gospel.
- 3. Giving up (letting go of things) is not for the purpose of getting more stuff or establishing social justice. It is for the purpose of being set free.
- 4. That which worldly wealth promises is delivered by the Body of Christ.

Worldly Christians

- 1. too often want to be saved for not from their idols worldly security, significance, etc.
- 2. too often want to be saved from the world's trouble, but not from the worldly idols.
- 3. see ministry as facilitating them in, not freeing them from the world.
- are frustrated in that the world's "fulfillments" are fleeting, but are afraid of the life style of God's kingdom.

Practical challenges for the evangelical Christian.

- 1. Don't buy the deceitful message of worldly wealth.
- 2. Be a part of the "100 fold return" for others.

1 Timothy 6:17-19

"17 Instruct those who are rich in this present world not to be conceited or to fix their hope on the uncertainty of riches, but on God, who richly supplies us with all things to enjoy. 18 Instruct them to do good, to be rich in good works, to be generous and ready to share, 19 storing up for themselves the treasure of a good foundation for the future, so that they may take hold of that which is life indeed."
