"¹ Jesus, therefore, six days before the Passover, came to Bethany where Lazarus was, whom Jesus had raised from the dead. ² So they made Him a supper there, and Martha was serving; but Lazarus was one of those reclining at the table with Him. ³ Mary therefore took a pound of very costly perfume of pure nard, and anointed the feet of Jesus, and wiped His feet with her hair; and the house was filled with the fragrance of the perfume. ⁴ But Judas Iscariot, one of His disciples, who was intending to betray Him, said, ⁵ "Why was this perfume not sold for three hundred denarii, and given to poor people?" ⁶ Now he said this, not because he was concerned about the poor, but because he was a thief, and as he had the money box, he used to pilfer what was put into it. ⁷ Jesus therefore said, "Let her alone, in order that she may keep it for the day of My burial. ⁸ For the poor you always have with you, but you do not always have Me."

Material wealth can be used in the service of three things.

- **Self** - self gratification
- **Others** - social responsibility
- **God** - spiritual worship

This story stands as a challenge to all disciples of Jesus who reduce Christian faith to social ethics and personal fulfillment outside the context of spiritual peace through the cross of Christ.

Observation #1

The ethics of work and wealth start with worshipful attention to Jesus rather than the poor.

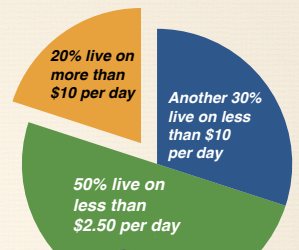

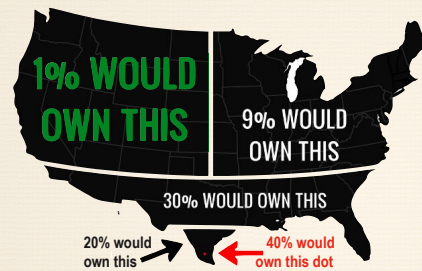


The have-nots and the have-yachts

If U.S. land were divided like U.S. wealth



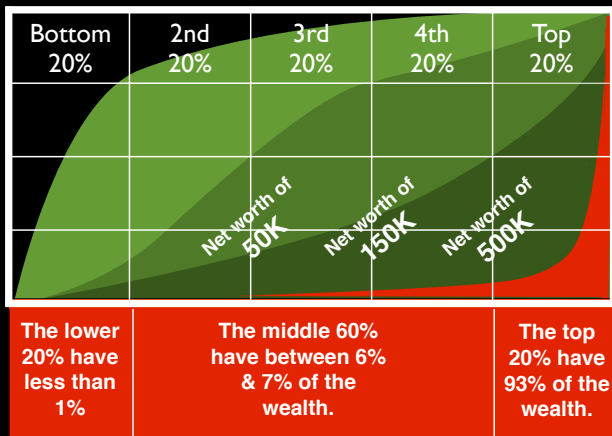
The challenge is to produce a more just distribution of goods & services without killing freedom and productivity.

The biggest worry with **concentration of wealth** is that the 1% will buy themselves favors from government.

Note that **the 40% in the red dot** still have more than most of the people in the EU let alone the rest of the world.

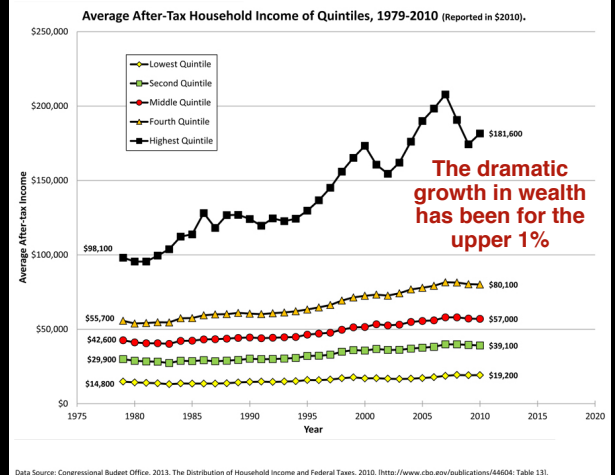
The problem with **the 40% in the red dot** is that their lack of wealth is linked to dignity, access to goods and services, influence, and opportunity.

The top ten highest-paid CEOs in the United States each received over \$100 million last year, according to a survey by GMI (Global Market Insight) Ratings.



The 2012 income of the highest paid of the CEO's, Facebook's Mark Zuckerberg (\$2.3 billion in stock options), would be enough to pay the salaries of all 2,300 transit workers in the Bay Area (where Zuckerberg lives) for more than 16 years.

Yet in the midst of the four-day strike that just ended, it was the transit workers who were denounced by the media and politicians as overpaid!

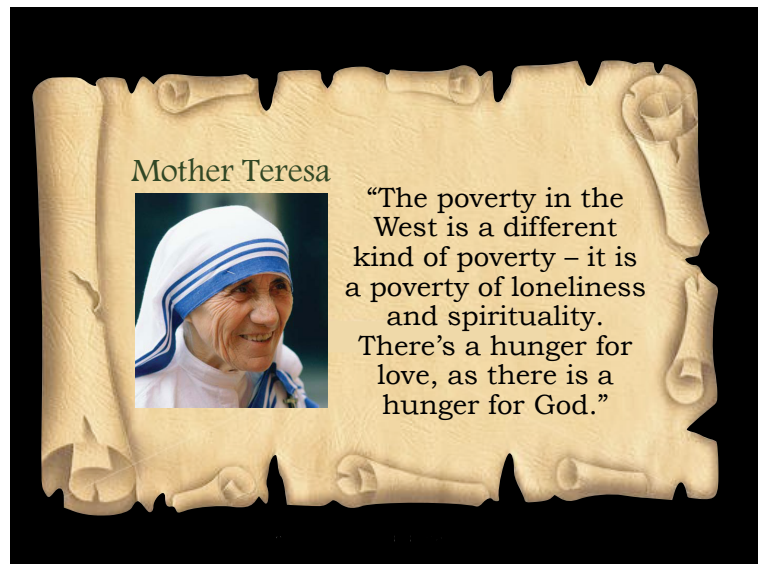
Poverty has a profile.

% of each group that is under the poverty level.

- Dropping out of high school (36%)
- Single female with children (46%)
- From a poor home (50%?)
- African American (30%)
- Hispanic (31%)
- Native American (26%)
- Children under 18 years of age (22%)
- Elderly over 65 years of age (22%)

Material poverty is indexed to:

- Crime and social unrest
- Marriage & family disfunction
- Personal physical and emotional health



Poverty is about more than material needs.

Social
- not connected to a supportive community or the social structures of power.

Political
- not free to effect change in one's life situation.

Material
- not able to afford basics (food, shelter, etc.)

Spiritual
- not empowered from within with hope, dignity, and purpose from a relationship with God.

Where to start ~

1. *Listen, touch, pray with, and give time to those to whom you minister.*
2. *Support ministries that enable #1 to take place.*
3. *Promote a mixed economic culture within the church.*
4. *Stop perpetuating a economically segregated social life.*
